FINE NEW CEMETERY OPENS HERE

Filling a long-felt need for a burial ground of this type, the Duncan Heights cemetery opens officially Sunday.

Heretofore and in the past it has been necessary for our people to accept undesirable plots or to pay exorbitant prices with the receipt of few privileges. But now this condition is remedied.

Duncan Heights cemetery, situated in the ideal burial section of the Pittsburgh district is offering choice lots for investment or immediate use at a much more reasonable figure than that which was commanded by far less desirable grounds.

Duncan Heights cemetery is a large tract less than 30 minutes drive from any part of Pittsburgh by newly paved roads. Construction work has been started and a program of landscaping put into effect which will very soon transform the inherent natural beauty of the property into the finest and most beautiful burial tract in Pennsylvania. Tall poplar trees are being placed at close intervals entirely bordering the grounds. Roads are under construction and a decorative sunken lake is being excavated. Evergreen shrubbery and grass walks will be placed within a short time.

Duncan Heights cemetery has created a trust fund for the perpetual care of the grounds, which means that a certain percentage of the sale price of each lot is set aside for the purpose of permanent upkeep of the cemetery. This feature will appeal to those who have witnessed the bleak desolation of a neglected burial place.

The inspiration behind the Duncan Heights cemetery is a noble and ambitious thought, studiously planned and efficiently and conscientiously executed. All honor and good fortune are due the developers of this splendid project.

SAYS THERE ARE NO PURE RACES

NEW YORK, June 18.—(ANP)—There are no pure races, according to Dr. Earnest A. Hootin, professor of anthropology at Harvard University, in his new book, "Up from the Ape," published by the Macmillan Company.

The writer characterizes as "a ridiculous boast" the claim of "self-styled Nordics" that they have race purity and superiority over other races.

Dr. Hootin finds that there is probably not a single Nordic of unmixed racial antecedents in the world and that most of them are tainted with Mongoloid Lappish blood.

Not only are the Nordics like all the other races in the world, the product of a mixture of different races, but neither they nor any other group enjoys any marked intellectual or spiritual advantages.

Further, Dr. Hootin defends the Negro races against "scientifically unfounded" charges of alleged inferiority. There is a great deal to show that intermarriage and mixture of races is a fine thing for the human race, the Harvard anthropologist explains. He points out that in many cases, the children of mixed blood are found to be taller and of greater vitality than either of the parent races.

The book was released on Tuesday.

WIFE AND RIVAL IN DUEL

POTTSVILLE, Pa., June 18.—Mrs. Rose Turner, of Minersville street, is being held at the county prison to await the result of injuries alleged to have been inflicted by her upon Mrs. Warren Willis, also a resident of that section.

Mrs. Willis is a patient at the Pottsville Hospital having sustained a broken arm and severe stab wounds of the face and back in what is alleged to have been a battle between the women over the husband of one of them.

According to officers 25 stitches were required to close Mrs. Willis' wounds, believed to have been inflicted by a knife. How the woman's arm was broken was not disclosed at the hearing which was merely a preliminary one.
